MILLENNIUM OF THE BATTLE OF ASSANDUN COMMEMORATION SERVICE 16 OCTOBER 2016



Welcome to our service, as we commemorate 1000 years since the Battle of Assandun on 18 October 1016. Please join in the hymns, and the responses shown in **bold type.** Please also join us for refreshments in the church afterwards.

We are delighted and privileged to welcome the Right Revd Dr Rowan Williams, previously Archbishop of Canterbury and currently Master of Magdalene College Cambridge, as our preacher.

Essex in 1016 was very different from today, and yet that battle helped shape our national story. Cnut, once he became king, worked hard to reconcile his people into their new kingdom, and to uphold the laws of the English people and the Christian faith, before yet another invader came only 50 years later to change the culture of England for ever. We remember with respect how Cnut founded a church for those who fell in the conflict - maybe the very church in which we meet today.

The story of that battle, like so much of history, shows up the messiness of human lives: the tension between violence and peace; the different perceptions of the different factions, both believing their cause was right or at least justifiable; the burning need in the human heart for peace. And it reminds us too that true kingship rests with God, the author of true peace: the God whom we worship and trust and who longs for us to follow him. And as we still see conflict all around us, let us commit ourselves anew to strive for an end to division and for peace.

During the service the Millennium Banners, illustrating the story of the battle and Cnut's foundation of the church, will be dedicated for display in this church.
