Jeremy writes...I don't know what your experiences were, but at my school careers advice was rather useless. The best bit of advice I ever received was at a family get-together for my father's side of the family. Everyone there was either a teacher or a chartered accountant (remember – no-one chooses their family). Their advice was; "Jeremy, whatever

you do in life don't become a teacher or an accountant." It seemed like good advice and I took it. August must be a blessed relief for teachers. At long last they've come to the end of a long academic year, and they have earned every minute of the break they're enjoying. Though, it is a relative break, as time off from children does not mean time off from preparation, paperwork and the like. Also, for many, it is not the profession they joined: children now face examinations almost from starting school to satisfy the neurosis of a control society; that very same society also demands that schools take up many of the basic educational tasks that were once the responsibility of society itself and especially the parents. The culture of the Bible, and particularly the Old Testament, viewed children as one of God's greatest blessings, an unmerited gift whose existence blessed the whole of society in turn. With such a belief hovering in the background it is not surprising that the nurture and care of those children was seen as a shared responsibility, and not just the task of parents, or preferably qualified professionals. This is part of the reason that I value Church and other faith schools. Their existence demonstrates that the nurture of children is more than merely a devolved responsibility, but is fundamental to the human task, just as faith is fundamental to human meaning. continued

Maybe we can learn from this: to look at the tasks that others do and recognise that our welfare is in part dependent on their labour, and theirs on ours; and, to accept that this gives us a mutual responsibility one for the other. Maybe then we will not be so ready to offload our responsibilities on other people, but will be more willing to face the needs of our society collaboratively



Where is Hadstock's Defibrillator?

<u>Here in</u> the old Telephone Box that is on the footpath at the bottom of the Village Green. It's the yellow box you can see.

If someone sends you to get it you have to be given a code by the 999 emergency operator to be able to open the outer yellow box and take out the Defibrillator box with the kit inside. He/she will then talk you through what to do next. The machine itself has spoken instructions.

NEWS FROM THE VILLAGE HALL

Firstly, a huge thank you to everyone involved in this year's very successful fete. We have received a donation of half their proceeds from the Fete Committee. This income is a vital contribution to our annual running costs and despite a current high interest in private hire of the Hall, is essential in ensuring that the Village Hall continues to be an asset for all the village to use.

As many of you are aware, Church Path is in a very poor state of repair. The PCC have arranged for remedial work to take place in August and we have been asked to contribute a share towards costs. We will contribute.

In the last month we have had a new locking system fitted to the French windows at the rear of the hall. Instructions for use are fixed to the wall by the door and we hope that you will all find it much easier to operate.

Unfortunately, the curtain rail supporting the long curtains on the main window has become detached from the wall and the curtains have had to be removed. We do not have precise details of how this occurred. Arrangements are in place to obtain a more heavy-duty rail which will be fixed to a baton for security before the curtains are rehung.

It has, to date, been part of our Hire agreement that hirers who do not reside in Hadstock, are asked for a £100 deposit when hiring for a private event. Unfortunately, due to an increase in damage to the building and its contents, we have decided that this requirement for the deposit will be extended to villagers. The £100 will be returned in full if the Hall is cleaned, free of all rubbish, and there is no damage found on inspection at the end of the event. All hirers are asked to check the hall on entry and to notify us, at the start of their hire period, of any damage or problems they find before their event. We do regret that recent experience has made this necessary.

We have made a grant application to the National Lottery for funding to repair, repaint and double glaze the windows in the hall. We anticipate a response in about 12 weeks.

A beginner's guide to hedgerows

A beginner's guide to hedgerows What is a hedgerow? Firstly, we need to define exactly what a hedgerow is. Natural England provides the following definition:

'A hedgerow is defined as any boundary line of trees or shrubs over 20m long and less than 5m wide, and where any gaps between the trees or shrub species are less that 20m wide.'

Put more simply, a hedgerow is a closely-grown mass of woody vegetation that grows in a line – and it's this being in one long line that makes it different from simply a bush or tree.

A brief history of hedgerows It's commonly thought that most hedgerows are recent additions to the countryside following the Enclosure Acts between 1750 and 1850, where wide, open spaces were broken up into individually-owned plots. But at least half of our hedges are older than this – and many are hundreds of years old.

Two-thirds of England's landscapes have continuously had hedgerows for a thousand years or more; some hedgerow systems date back to prehistoric times, and most were well established by the Anglo-Saxon period (from AD 410).

Many of our hedgerows are both ancient and historically interesting, especially where they mark parish boundaries and ancient monuments. Often beautiful older hedgerow trees, their lives prolonged by careful management over the years, reveal the great age of hedgerows and their importance to our ancestors.

The oldest known surviving hedgerow in England is in Cambridgeshire - Judith's Hedge, near Monks Wood, (There is much more information on the CPRE website) If anyone knows about the Hedgerows in Hadstock please write in to the Mag. - hadstockmag@btinternet.com
