October 2024

Jeremy writes September is, as always, a busy month; full of all the meetings and events that the new school term generates. I'll let you in on a secret: I'm always glad when it is over. Now we come to October and the Church can pause for breath and take a look ahead at the various celebrations and commemorations to come in November through All Saints, All Souls and Remembrance Sunday,

and beyond those; Christmas.

In October the Parishes of Debden and Wimbish, and the whole Team, will be welcoming our new minister, Rev Lynda Sebbage. Lynda will be licensed by Bishop Guli on Thursday 24th October at Debden Church. Please hold Lynda in your prayers. Lynda is an experienced Priest who brings with her many gifts that will strengthen her two Churches and support the wider Team. It may be tempting to hope that things will continue as before now a replacement priest is installed. But Lynda is not John. We entrust that just as God called John elsewhere, God also called Lynda here, with her particular gifts and character. This is part of God's work of re-creation: "Behold, I do a new thing" (Isaiah 43:19).

At the end of September, we shall have said goodbye to Matt Williamson. Matt has worked in the Team for a number of years as our Youth and Children's Leader. He has done a terrific job of engaging with young people of all ages, in our churches, schools and the wider community. As with many ministers, mush of his best work is hidden away from public gaze. I know that he has touched the lives of many with Gospel hope, and I am thankful for that. He goes to be Youth, Children and Families Advisor for this Diocese. Please hold him, and the family, in your prayers at this time. How shall we continue and grow what Matt has been leading? I hope we will recruit a new person, but their role will be necessarily different from the one Matt was recruited to. What should it look like?

I suspect that many churchgoers have a secret suspicion that their faith is irrelevant in a modern world; that they have nothing to say or offer. *continued*

That is why their faith has become private and internalised and its expression must be preserved at all costs.

Instead, we should have confidence to own our faith in the God who calls and sends, and seek to apply it is relevant ways. However, becoming outward looking can seem like an enormous task; one too big to tackle. We shouldn't be discouraged. Our Church celebrations and commemorations in Autumn only have meaning if we are able to look beyond them to the story of Christmas, of God getting off his throne and mucking in with our world in all its faded glory. That's the beginning of the salvation story. God entrusted his Church to continue with what he had started; to put rich meaning into the events of life by getting our hands dirty a little. When we do that we churchsafe Christians may find that we are indeed standing on Holy ground, wherever God may call us to be.

On Monday 2nd September Hadstock Book Club met to discuss

His Bloody Project by Graeme Macrae-Burnet

It is set in 1869 and relates the peculiar case of a brutal triple murder committed by a seventeen-year-old boy in the remote crofting community of Culduie, Wester Ross, in the north-western Highlands of Scotland. The fact that Roderick Macrae is guilty of the heinous act is never really called into question.

The primary thread of the book is Roddy's account of what drove him to the murders, namely increasing persecution and bullying from which there was no escape.

Though the subject matter was off-putting for some, everyone who read the book agreed it was well-written, and it provoked some fascinating and wide-ranging discussions about its relevance today.

In fact, we talked about the book for much longer than usual.

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

Footpaths

This exceptional 'growing' year - particularly it seems for nettles, brambles and bindweed - has seen encroachment on village footpaths far exceeding levels in past years. We have just (Friday 13th!) cleared the elevated stretch of footpath along the Linton Road for the third time this year - something I don't believe we've ever had to do before. The stretches along the 'horse paddock' fields leading to Len's Path have also (over)grown profusely and Len's path itself has needed more attention than usual.

Essex CC are supposed to keep all Public Footpaths clear, however any action they do take is unannounced and once a year at best, and the Uttlesford 'Rangers' who we could sometimes call on for help in the past have now been disbanded.

This means that - as has been the case for years - the Parish Council tries to maintain the core footpaths in and around the village and - finances being tight - relies on volunteers. I want to thank the selection of village residents (who also helped dig out the ditch on the Linton Road a few months ago) who assist the PC members - but I also want to appeal for more people to come forward, so that we are not always dependent on the 'usual suspects' Invariably, these are convivial sessions with a satisfyingly evident job well done afterwards. Home Energy Surveys/EPC

For those who have shown an interest in a Home Energy Survey and EPC assessment we will be contacting you during October to arrange times for Adrian Rowlands, Home Energy Champion, to visit you and carry out the review.

We are also engaging Jonathan Ashe, surveyor, who specialises in working with traditional/listed buildings to run a session and carry out a number of retrofit reviews.

We will be asking people to make a small contribution towards the cost of their Home Energy/EPC review so that we can make them available to as many people as possible.

Our thermal camera

We have acquired a thermal camera which will be made available for loan from November.

At our October Event (Friday, 25th), Dr Chris Doyle will run a session on how to use the camera and more importantly what you will see and how to interpret the images.

We would ask anyone who wants to use the camera to come to this session.

Autumn/Winter Events

The first of these was delivered in September as a discussion on the Survey results and a chance to ask questions on Home Energy topics.

Events will take place each month as advertised in this magazine and on our website.



Results of the Sustainable Hadstock Survey.

Thanks to the 110 households in Hadstock who completed and returned your questionnaires over the last couple of

months. This has enabled us to build up a comprehensive picture of the current status quo for housing, and gives us an insight into the improvements that can be made to our housing energy efficiency and the nature around our village, as well as the obstacles that we need to overcome as we move forward.




The first question we asked was about what people wanted to get from the Sustainable Hadstock project. This graph shows the combination of first, second and third choices.

Sixty-eight percent of people included 'reducing fuel bills' as one of their options, but there was also widespread support for all the other objectives including improving Hadstock's nature and biodiversity, reducing our CO2 emissions, making houses cosier and reducing the impact of our household waste.

We were particularly keen to assess what people were keen to get involved with or learn more about, and there was plenty of enthusiasm on all fronts. We'll be responding with a number of initiatives including surveys of energy efficiency for some houses, and we will be purchasing a thermal camera so anyone who is interested can see where the warmth is escaping from their homes

We will also be running information sessions on the topics where there was most interest, for instance to disseminate the results of *the Hadstock*


Biodiversity and Nature Study, to discuss recycling and waste plastics reduction and to give details of the means-tested grants that will be relevant to some residents for home insulation and draught-proofing.



Hadstock has a lot of types of houses and many historic houses; almost half of all respondents lived in historic houses built before 1920 (and quite a few much older

still). There was a lot of concern that it was much more difficult to make energy-saving changes to listed buildings. We'll respond to this by bringing in an expert who specialises in energy efficiency for Traditional Buildings to discuss what can be done now and what changes are likely in the future. We will also be sharing experiences from householders – for instance even though double glazing is often not allowed in the original windows of listed buildings, there are new types of secondary glazing that are practically invisible and very efficient.

Currently 72% of homes use a gas boiler as their primary source of heating, and a further 18% have oil boilers. Five houses have wood burning stoves as their main source of heating, but (to our surprise) about two thirds of homes also burn wood in open fires or stoves to supplement their central heating. We are currently analysing the barriers that are stopping residents from moving towards less costly and more environmentally friendly ways of heating their homes. Initial results from the survey suggest that the non-listed buildings are just as likely to have oil boilers as listed buildings, but residents with oil boilers are less interested in making changes to their energy efficiency than others.



As this graph shows, only a small minority of Hadstock homes report having EPCs in the B and C range and none have an A rating. *(EPCs, or Energy Performance Certificates, give a summary of the energy efficiency of a building, and also suggest where improvements could be made to improve the rating)*. A quarter of respondents didn't know whether their house had an EPC rating, but a lot of residents were keen to get an EPC and discuss what they could do, and this project will plan to provide as many as possible of these opportunities. By the end of the Sustainable Hadstock project we hope that many more houses will be in the B-C range by making improvements to insulation, draught-proofing, lighting, etc.

We will be running events to inform you about some of the new technologies for reducing bills and carbon emissions; there was particular enthusiasm for sessions on solar panels, storage batteries and heat pumps.

We also gathered useful information on how best to communicate with people in the Village, where and when to hold meetings; Evening meetings in the Village Hall are the most popular format, followed by Saturday mornings. The Hadstock magazine is still the preferred source of information for almost 80% of residents, closely followed by the HadstockInfo email. We will be using both – please keep a look out! Getting responses from over 80% of the homes in Hadstock shows what a vibrant community we have, and how much enthusiasm there is for the Sustainable Hadstock project.

We're particularly grateful to those people who distributed and collected the questionnaires. Thank you all.

Now we know where we stand, you will be hearing a lot more from us in the coming months with information, events and practical solutions for you to try

Please come along to hear more and ask your questions.

17,114 households in Uttlesford are failing to claim £40,432,011 of support each year. Are you missing out?

Pension Credit:

The Chancellor's removal of the Winter Fuel Payment for older people not claiming Pension Credit last month, highlights the importance of making sure you are claiming all the benefits you are entitled to.

661 older people living in Uttlesford are eligible for but not claiming Pension Credit

If you are just £500 over the income threshold to claim Pension Credit, **you could be better off** by having lower income and claiming Pension Credit and the Winter Fuel Payment.

Claiming pension credit unlocks other support such as Housing Benefit and Council Tax Support. It also opens up eligibility for social tariffs, the warm home discount, cheaper broadband, free TV licences and cheaper water bills. <u>Universal Credit:</u>

1,015 people who are on a low income or unemployed and living in Uttlesford are missing out on this help with essential living costs.

If you receive Universal Credit, you may be able to get help with other things such as healthcare costs, free school meals, healthy start vouchers, social tariffs, cheaper broadband and water bills.

Uttlesford families eligible for Universal Credit are missing out on an extra £7,014,410 of support each year in the form of free school meals and pupil premium funding.

<u>Child Benefit:</u> 7,865 Uttlesford Families are missing out on £14,980,407 in child benefit payments each year. Many people don't realise the **two-child limit does not apply to Child Benefit**

Child Benefit can only be backdated for a maximum of 3 months, so if you haven't yet claimed Child Benefit for your third and subsequent children, do so as soon as possible.
