Over the summer "The Friends" are pleased to have been able to contribute £2,250 towards the new Belfry bird screens in the church Bell Tower, and £5,000 towards the resurfacing of the Church Path. Birds in the Belfry

A few years ago, a number of pigeons found their way into the Belfry (that is the room at the top of the tower where the bells are hung) but not out again. When discovered, the resultant mess required specialist cleaners to make good and sanitise the space. The Belfry has openings on all four sides protected by louvres. To stop birds getting in mesh of various sorts and bits of Perspex had been installed on the inside of the louvres. Over the years these had come loose and various ways of securing them including odd bits of wood and bamboo canes had been used. It was decided that this year a proper, long lasting solution was needed. We now have new mesh and nice new wooden frames. You can't see any of this, but the pigeons know it is there..... Bick

Church Roadway Repair

Over the years the roadway from Beam Ends to the Church and Village Hall, through constant use, has slowly been breaking down. During the last twenty years occasional "make do and mend" repairs were undertaken by Hamish McIlwrick and this kept the surface manageable.

Latterly, the surface was becoming difficult to negotiate, both by vehicles and pedestrians and was in a potentially dangerous state. As a result, the Parochial Church Council (PCC) members agreed that some serious repair and re-instatement work was required.

Roadwork contractors were invited to provide a price to achieve a robust, long-lasting improvement to the surface and make it fit for purpose. Once a price was established (over £10,000) the next question was "How would the cost of this work be funded?"

Discussions took place with the Village Hall Management Committee and they have agreed to provide £2,500 payable over four years. The Friends of St Botolph and they, have provided a grant of £5,000. For both these generous gestures the PCC records its heartfelt thanks.

The work has now been completed and the finished product looks splendid and adds very much to the appearance of the approach to both the Church and the Village Hall. This, we very much hope, will give us all many years of useful service. If you have not yet seen it, I suggest you spare a few minutes to have a look. **Tim Boyden**

A Century of Surveys returned – thanks to all.

Survey

Thanks to everyone who completed their Surveys – and to all the team that delivered and collected them.

We now have over 100 forms back – more than 70% of the households in the Parish. This is really fantastic and way above the experience of other villages doing similar surveys.

Our task is now to review, analyse and most importantly, understand what areas you would like the initiative to focus on over the Autumn/Winter.

To give you feedback and what happens next we will:

- Organise a session at the end of September to present the findings and discuss the next steps with you (Friday 27 Sept, Village Hall, 6.30pm-7.30pm)
- Give a summary of the main findings and actions going forward in the next Hadstock October Magazine
- Contact those of you who asked about Home Energy Assessments (EPC/Retrofit Analysis) and use of a thermal imaging camera to discuss the practicalities.

Emergency Appeal for GAZA

Icknield Way Westwards.

One of the many advantages of living in Hadstock is being only a few hundred yards away from the historic Icknield Way long-distance footpath that runs from North of London in one direction, and to Norfolk in the other. During CV19 lockdown I walked some of the path towards Bury St Edmunds; Here's a brief description of my ramble two years ago heading in the other direction, south-west towards Baldock.

I left Hadstock at first light, just before 7am, and headed towards Penn Farm and up onto the signposted Icknield Way beyond the farmhouse, and then off past Burton Farm, across the main road to skirt Great Chesterford and over a footbridge high above the M11.

I'd bought an excellent guide book to the whole of the path, but it's also easy to download a GPX file onto one's phone. The walk is reasonably well signposted, but there are occasional turns that could be missed.



The path becomes scenic walking around and across fields and some welcome well-laden apple trees on the verges before walking past the picturesque church in Strethall.

More attractive countryside and welcome sunshine took me to Elmdon; by now it was warming up nicely, and a welcome change to walk through a village. The bench opposite the bus stop provided was a good stop for a second breakfast.

The footpath continued on through wide open spaces and past woodlands. By this time, I was going through some pretty remote countryside and I walked several miles between seeing anyone – usually dog walkers near towns (Some say that the southeast of England is overcrowded!).

Eventually the ancient footpath approaches Royston, and less pleasant walking within earshot of main roads. In Royston I came across the first shops of the day. It was now lunchtime and some fish

and chips before the second half of the walk. I was hoping to have a pint in a pub as I left Royston but before I knew it, I was beyond civilisation again and walking across the historic chalk downs.

The path continues to Baldock. The terrain kept changing, and after 19 miles I saw my first herds of livestock; first goats then cattle.

I was running low on liquids and wished that I'd filled up on coffee or water at Royston. There wasn't a single shop on the path between Royston and Baldock. I struck lucky when I stuck my head into the old church at Sandon (the footpath went through the graveyard) and there was a bottle of drinking (not holy) water for thirsty walkers.

The next village, Wallington, was perhaps the most interesting en route; it was here that George Orwell wrote Animal Farm, got married, went to fight in the Spanish civil war, and ran a sweet shop.

By this point my feet were starting to feel the 28 miles since leaving Hadstock and the sun was setting so took a shortcut directly to Baldock on the country roads rather than doing another few miles on the ancient path. I crossed the bypass and got into Baldock station as it was getting dark. The train to Cambridge and bus to the Grip then lift from Gill meant I got back home at about 8:30pm.

Walking south-west on the Icknield Way from Hadstock has one big advantage over heading out in the opposite direction; you can get public transport back from either Royston (16 miles) or Baldock (30 miles). The Icknield Way is less well known that other long-distance paths but still a fabulous way to enjoy our local biodiversity for a few hours or a few days. If it was on Tripadvisor I'd give it five stars! Brendan Burchell, Bardsfield, Walden Rd.


